Be Prepared For Winter Power Outages & Hazardous Driving Conditions

A recent study conducted by Energy + Environmental Economics (E3) indicates there is the potential for a power reliability gap in 2026, which could cause power blackouts in the Pacific Northwest. The gap is a result of higher demand for electricity brought on by population growth, more EVs on the highways, and industrial users like data centers locating throughout the Northwest.

The greatest chance of blackouts impacting our region could occur if a cold snap lasts for several days. Fall River Electric wants its members to be prepared in the rare instance of a power interruption during the winter season that lasts more than a few hours. The Co-op's website, www.fallriverelectric.com, has added a section under the tab "My Safety" to aid members with their preparation efforts. This section also addresses preparation for members who have Airbnb short-term rental properties.

Holiday Lighting Tips

This year is rapidly drawing to a close. That means the holiday lighting season is back! If your home space needs a decorative refresh, here are some tips to take your artistic stylings to the next level. There are two areas to cover:

Safety is up first. If your lights are ground mounted or can be installed standing on the floor or ground, you can skip ahead. However, since most decorations involve some installation at height, you need to do the following:

- 1. Have a ground crew (one or two people) to steady your ladder and pass up the decorations ... an invaluable part of safety and for keeping you supplied with untangled light strings, fasteners, and encouragement.
- Remember to keep a safe distance from all overhead electric wires.
- 3. Do not overreach. If you cannot get to a point with your body completely centered between the sides of the ladder, get down and relocate it.
- Do not overload circuits by stringing more light sets together than the manufacturer recommends.
- Check your wires for breaks and cracks in the insulation that can lead to shorts.

Most of these tips apply to outside decorating activities but several apply to the inside, too.

Light selection is a key to your holiday success. LED lights provide longevity, brilliant color, and cost savings. A reasonable estimate of power consumption is 7 watts per 100 lights. Old incandescent bulbs use 12 watts. A string of 100 devours 1200 watts. Want to invest in even greater savings operating holiday lights? Invest in timers to turn the lights on and off automatically. Enjoy the holiday and lights while saving money!

Auto Pay Reminder

Mark January 26, 2026, on your calendar if you are a Fall River Electric member that utilizes Auto Pay to pay your monthly bill with a credit or debit card. Fall River Electric will be switching to a new software system for managing member accounts called SmartHub. For security reasons, federal law prohibits the automatic transfer of credit card or debit card numbers to this new system. Members will need to re-register for Auto Pay on January 26, 2026. TAKE SAFETY HOME: Circuit Breakers

It is time to inspect your circuit breaker panel. Look for burn marks and loose wires. Then contact a licensed electrician before attempting to make repairs yourself. Here are some things you can do yourself:

- Ensure your panel is clear of clutter.
- See that your panel's individual breakers are properly 2. labeled.
- Be cautious around your panel and never work on the panel yourself.

If you have a breaker that "trips" frequently, contact a licensed electrician to inspect and make any necessary repairs. Inspecting your panel and its breakers can help prevent electrical fires.
