
Auto Pay Change Coming January 2026

Fall River Electric owner-members that utilize Auto Pay using a credit or debit card will need to re-register their card information on January 26, 2026, when the Co-op switches software system vendors. For security reasons, federal law prohibits the automatic transfer of credit card or debit card numbers to a new system. It must be done manually by the cardholder.

This does not impact members that use a bank account for Auto Pay.

Applications Are Open For Higher Education Scholarships Available From Fall River Electric



Scholarship applications are available at Fall River's website, fallriverelectric.com/scholarships. The deadline to apply is March 20, so hurry! Scholarships will be awarded at Fall River Electric's annual business meeting on June 13 in Driggs and are funded by unclaimed Patronage Capital.

Students who have previously received a scholarship from Fall River Electric are reminded that they need to re-apply each year to continue to receive scholarship assistance.


Thousands of dollars in scholarships will be made available to current high school seniors who are planning to attend college or receive vocational training this coming fall. Each scholarship is valued at \$2,400, paid over four years, as part of Fall River Electric's college and continuing education scholarship program. All applicants (students) must have parents or guardians who are owner-members (customers) of Fall River Electric.

Fall River Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors is also offering a \$2,400 yearly scholarship to a member or a child of a member that is interested in a utility career as a lineman. This scholarship will be awarded to ONE person who plans to enroll in a lineman college. The applicant or their parents or guardians must be members of Fall River Electric to qualify. Tis The Season For Roof Avalanches



Once the snow piles high, snow sliding off a roof is a very dangerous risk. Hundreds of pounds of falling snow and ice can cause severe injuries and even death. Additionally, a roof avalanche can cause major property damage to vehicles, gutters, decks, landscaping, and even roof structural damage, too.

Stay aware and prepared this winter season. Here are some suggestions to prevent roof avalanches:

they melt, allowing only small amounts to fall safely.

- Use a Roof Rake:** Safely removes snow from the roof's edge while you remain on the ground, reducing load and impact.
- Professional Removal:** Hire fully insured, experienced experts for large or dangerous snow loads.
- Stay Away:** Avoid walking or parking directly under snow-loaded eaves.

One foot of snow on your roof can create up to 21 pounds per square foot. That weight can increase to more than 100 pounds per square foot with five or more feet of snow. Take the time to walk the perimeter of your home, just in case there's an 8-foot snow drift that's not visible from your driveway. Make it a habit to monitor your roof perimeter, noting any snow build up spots, after every major snowfall. It will be cold, and it won't be fun but it will be far less painful than a roof collapse or an ice dam that causes thousands of dollars in damage to your home and your valuables or worse yet, injures a member of your family.
