- Two 36-inch self-stick door sweeps that you can cut to the length you need to seal from the cold; and
- A set of 2 New Zealand wool dryer balls to help reduce drying time and lower your energy usage.

Members that attend the business meeting at 10 a.m. will be entered into a random drawing to win a \$1,000 energy credit or a 65-inch big screen TV or one of dozens of other prizes. Do not miss the linemen's high-voltage electrical safety demonstration for a chance to win a professional chain saw.

Want to be greener? Fall River Electric Cooperative offers owner-members two ways to increase green energy for your home.

Number one is our Cooperative Solar that allows members to benefit from solar energy production, even if they cannot put solar on their own rooftop. Subscribing members to this community solar program will be guaranteed a "one-to-one" kilowatt hour exchange for the next twenty-plus years! For every kilowatt hour of solar generation, you will receive a credit for a kilowatt hour. Each month you will see that credit on your statement for the kilowatt-hours of solar power your units generate. No need to spend thousands of dollars for your own rooftop solar system when you can sign up with Fall River, plus you will be contribut-

Second is Green Power, a program where we offer members all their energy in a combination with locally produced, small hydropower and clean, renewable green energy from landfill biomass gas. You can sign up for this program on our website at fallriverelectric. com/green-power.

Take Safety Home: Emergency Communication

If a disaster happens and you are not with your family, how will you be able to reach them to let them know you are safe or need help? Create an emergency communication plan, so you know how to reach each other and where to meet in an emergency. Planning starts with three simple steps:



1. Collect the needed info. Create a

paper copy of contact information for your family and other important people or offices like doctors, schools, or caregivers.

2. Share that information. Make sure every member of your family carries a copy of your contact list in their backpack, purse, or wallet. Use ready.gov/make-a-plan to complete your plan.

3. Practice your plan during a regular household meeting.

If a disaster occurs, remember that text messages may get through when a cell call cannot. Once your contact list is complete, decide on a safe, familiar place where your family can meet and reunite. It is never too late to plan ahead.

May Is Electrical Safety Month



May is Electrical Safety Month and Fall River Electric's concern for safety extends beyond our staff members. We care deeply about the safety of our ownermembers, so we encourage you to plug into safety. According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International, thousands of people in the U.S. are critically injured and or killed because of electrical fires, accidents, and electrocution in their own homes.

To promote safety education in our local communities, we conduct free electrical safety demonstrations for elementary school students throughout our service area. This year we hosted over eight hundred students from twelve of the elementary schools. Additionally, we host three elec-

tric safety demonstrations for members at our annual Energy Expo each year.
