Winter Weather Is On Its Way-Now Is The Time To Prepare

The power system operated by Fall River Electric is very reliable, but some power outages cannot be prevented, especially those caused by winter weather. We want to ensure our owner-members are prepared for a power outage in snowy conditions.

You may not be at home when the storm starts, so it is important to have basic supplies of food and water, as well as a way to stay warm without power in several locations, such as your workplace, vehicle, and/or school. You can build your supplies over time by adding a few items each week or month. Gather, in advance, the necessary supplies and items you will need to stay safe after the winter storm passes. Below are recommended areas to focus on:



MEDICAL NEEDS

Be equipped to tend to any current or unexpected medical conditions your family members may have. Ask your doctor about storing prescription medication such as at least a three-days' supply of heart and blood pressure medication, insulin for diabetics, and other prescription drugs such as inhalers for those with asthma. Include battery backup power for power-dependent mobility devices, oxygen, and other assistive technology needs.

TOOLS AND SAFETY ITEMS

Small items like matches, flashlights, a multitool, pocketknife, and a whistle (to signal for help) can make an enormous difference for your family while weathering a storm.

FOOD/SUPPLIES

Have at least a three-days' supply of non-perishable food and water for your family. Remember to store anything specific to your family's needs.

WARM CLOTHING & BLANKETS

Warm clothes and blankets can help prevent hypothermia. Do not forget warm, waterproof, and protective footwear, as well as gloves.



In Fall River Electric's service area, it is not uncommon for crews to find trees that have fallen into power lines or power lines weighed down by snow and ice that drop to dangerously low levels. Our service area includes over 2,500 miles of power lines covering more than 2,700 square miles and many of these lines are in difficult terrain.

DOES YOUR LIFE OR LIVELIHOOD DEPEND ON CONSTANT ELECTRICAL POWER?

If your answer is, "Yes," then you should consider purchasing and installing a back-up power generator.

A standby generator is permanently installed outside your home or business and runs on propane. Standby generators turn on automatically when the power shuts off, even if you are away from home. A transfer switch monitors utility power and transfers the electrical load to the generator if power is lost. A generator can power everything in your home, including lights, heating systems, appliances, water and sump pumps, security systems, and more.

Generac, Kohler, and Cummins standby generators are the most recognized brands and are available from several local installers. You can also call your local electrical contractor for recommendations. Our sister company, Fall River Propane, can install the propane tank and lines to power your new generator.



- Plumbing and electrical wiring where they enter your home;
- Open fireplace dampers; and
- **Electrical sockets and light switches.**

Take Safety Home – Understanding Alerts



As winter weather approaches, now is the time to get acquainted with wintertime weather alerts. Here are the three alerts most commonly used during the winter season:

Winter Storm Warning

This is issued when hazardous winter weather in the form of heavy snow, heavy freezing rain, or heavy sleet is imminent or occurring. Winter Storm Warnings are usually issued 12 to 24 hours before the event is expected to begin.

Winter Storm Watch

This alert informs the public about the possibility of a blizzard, heavy snow, and possible drifting of snow on roadways. Winter Storm Watches are usually issued 12 to 48 hours before the beginning of a winter storm.

Winter Weather Advisory

Advisories are issued for accumulations of snow, freezing drizzle, and sleet that will cause significant inconveniences and, if caution is not exercised, could lead to life-threatening situa-
